REPORT - NORTHERN CRAFT EXHIBITION 2018

28TH FEBRUARY – 2ND MARCH 2018

AT FORESHORE PARK IN SAVUSAVU

1.0 BACKGROUND

The 2018 Northern Craft Exhibition has been the fourth craft show organized by the Fiji Arts Council in partnership with the Ministry of Women since 2015 and it was pleasing to see the support that has been rendered to the women artisans of the three division of Cakaudrove, Bua and Macuata who were gathered at the Foreshore Park in Savusavu during the official opening on 28th February which was graced by Hon. Minister women , Children and Poverty Alleviation Mrs Mereseini Vuniwaga.

As mentioned by the Lady Minister in her maiden speech, "the focus of this year's expo is for artisans to produce quality products that are a level up from the last National Women's Expo and to build a new business culture amongst rural women artisans so that their products can connect to the growing market here in Fiji and abroad," she said.

The three days Craft Show witnessed the participation of the 145 Craft Practitioners from the 3 divisions - Bua, Macuata and Cakaudrove, on the many skills and talents that they competed in the various craft categories based on the information disseminated to them by the Fiji Arts Council through the Ministry of Women Northern Division Offices.

The ongoing collaboration and the re-established of partnership with the Ministry of Women from early 2015 with an aim to strengthen and support each other in moving forward for the empowerment and inspiring women, is an opportunity for FAC to fulfil the obligations necessary for craft practitioners and communities to elevate the standard and quality of *Fijian Made Handicrafts* to desirable high end fine products and meet the up-market standard.

And by doing this as being highlighted by the Hon. Minister ... "our women can enjoy a financial uplift to meet their own needs and in pursuing a better livelihood for their own families and communities alike.

This initiative will also keep alive traditional knowledge and skills which are our own identity and heritage as well. "The competitive platform will bring the very best amongst women entrepreneurs so that their hard work will bring economic benefits and financial independence. "We also believe that poverty can be alleviated as these artisans pursue better financial freedom and independence." end of quote.

Of all exhibitors in the three days event, 80 were selected to participate at the National Women's Expo in Suva, based on their ability to meet market demands and off course the quality of their products.

The Northern Craft Exhibition was part of the ongoing preparation and build up to the 2018 National Women's Expo which is a very significant annual event organized by the Ministry of Women, Children and Poverty Alleviation in partnership with the Fiji Arts Council to be staged in Suva from 21st -23rd June 2018.

Introduction:

Thank you for the warm welcome. It is indeed a delight for me to address you today as we gather to witness an exhibition of the crafts of women from the Macuata, Bua and Cakaudrove Provinces for the Northern Division Craft Show. This craft show is the fourth one in the series of craft shows to be held in the 2017-2018 fiscal year and it is pleasing to see the support that has been rendered to the women artisans of the division by all who are gathered here this morning.

You may know, the Divisional Craft Shows are a build up to the National Women's Expo, which is a very significant annual event of my Ministry. The 4th National Women's Expo will be held on the 21st to the 23rd June, 2018. The event will collectively commemorate International Women's Day and in particular, Rural Women's Day. As Fiji commits towards the global overarching tool of the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), the Event wishes to focus the same with its approaches and Programmes during this year's Expo.

The focus of this year's expo is for artisans to produce quality products that are a level up from the last National Women's Expo and to build a new business culture amongst rural women artisans so that their products can connect to the growing market here in Fiji and abroad. By so doing our women can enjoy a financial uplift to meet their own needs and in pursuing a better livelihood for their own families and communities alike. This initiative will also keep alive traditional knowledge and skills which are our own identity and heritage as well. The competitive platform will bring the very best amongst women entrepreneurs so that their hard work will bring economic benefits and financial independence. We also believe that poverty can be alleviated as these artisans pursue better financial freedom and independence.

In alignment with the 2018 International Women's Day theme, and with the expectation that participating women exhibitors are now more confident, prepared and better connected to markets, we have adopted the theme "Thriving women for economic growth" for the 2018 National Women's Expo. The key objective of the 2018 Expo is to drive towards dynamically engaging quality and quantity production of handicrafts to meet market demand to forge a sustainable source of income and empowerment for Fijian Women. Having this in mind, the event will also focus on allowing new artisans the opportunity to participate at the main event.

I am told that a total of 120 women artisans are participating in this 3-day Craft Show, 40 from each of the three provinces here in the North. Of all exhibitors, 80 will be selected to participate at the National Women's Expo in Suva, based on their ability to meet market demands, and off course the quality of their products.

I wish to reiterate the need to recognize the contribution of women to the development of our nation. Women, especially rural women, having toiled under circumstances of stereotypes for centuries owe it to themselves to embrace how they can be effective actors of development within their homes and the society. Also, families need to support the girls within their homes foremost in making strong minded, progressive and passionate women who can influence greater positive changes or themselves and those around them. Today, in contrast to the past centuries, we find women literate, educated, and liberated to lead. We find their surge forward not only in the political front, but also in social life where they act as agents of change contributing to economic development as well. Women's roles have expanded from being home makers to being the force behind the evolution of our societies.

Fiji has come a long way in transforming as a society that believes in the empowerment of women and recognizes their contribution to the development of our nation. Today, we have the highest number of women in Parliament in Fiji's democratic history. We have more women graduating from tertiary institutions than men and we have more women owning businesses than yester years. Women in Fiji are now having better access to justice when their human rights are violated through domestic violence and sexual abuse, and they are now provided with much better health care facilities. We have women who have shattered stereotypes by entering workforces that were ideally for men.

And this change has come about not without its struggles and sacrifices, protests and conflicts. This transformation is a result of Governments that valued equality for all Fijians, Civil Society Organizations that lobbied for women's human rights to be upheld, development partners that strengthened relations with Fiji to influence a better life for Fijian women, families that respected and supported women, and off course individuals who changed their perception of women's tradition roles in our societies. However, one can never say the world has seen gender equality and rights of women championed in the fullest sense because there is still a lot that is left to be achieved in this area.

The Fijian Government has gender equality and women's empowerment at the core of its mandate. Its commitment has reflected in the consistently increasing budget towards the National Women's Machinery over the past decade to better implement women's empowerment programs around the country. Also, the newly launched National Development Plan which maps out the way forward for Fiji and all Fijians to realize our full potential as a nation specifically recognizes the role of women in development. We have in place a National Gender Policy to mainstream gender across Government, with an understating that gender is a cross cutting issue and must be considered in every program and policy implemented by Government.

Also, the Fijian Government is continually improving laws and legislations to address the issues of discrimination and to adjudicate violations of women's rights. All programs and policies of Government are free from gender based discriminatory conditions and we continue to aim to establish facilities that will meet specific needs of women. In doing this, the Government through my Ministry has forged important relationships with women's organizations like the Ba Women's Forum and the Fiji Muslim League to further improve the economic participation of women in Fiji. Having said that, these two organizations are a great example of how women NGOs and faith-based organizations

can utilize their potential for not only their own affiliates but for all women in general. The bottom line is to push the gender agenda persistently and strive to achieve the gender related goals of the organization.

Earlier this month, the Honourable Prime Minister launched the Women's Training Centre, similar to the Makoi Women's Vocational Centre for the Ba Women's Forum which will be an instrumental avenue to build the capacities of women in the province of Ba to help them produce better and diverse products for more income generating opportunities. The concept of training and capacity building is crucial to improving quality of products

and services. Therefore, the 4^{th} National Women's Expo is targeted at engaging only 340 women from the divisional craft shows around the country.

The targeted number of participants has decreased compared to the past 3 years since the focus now is to select the best of the quality products produced by the women artisans as we want women to get attain the "Fijian Made" certification on their products and be able to export their products overseas. From what I have seen at the past expos, I am convinced that Fijian women artisans have tremendous potential to produce high quality crafts from the vicinity of their homes and this has been proven over the past years as the number of participants lessened year after year, yet the total sales kept increasing. Last year, the 475 women who participated in the National Women's Expo earned approximately half a million dollars in a span of 3 days.

Exhibitors, this should tell you that the demand for your products is high. It is now up to you as artisans to ensure that you meet the demands while creatively maintaining a high standard of your crafts.

With these words, it is my pleasure to declare the Northern Craft Show, open.

3.0 CRAFT COMPETITIONS – WOMEN'S PARTICIPATION:

One of the main events in staging the 3 days event was the Craft Competition amongst practitioners in the various categories of both Traditional and Contemporary Products which was organized and sponsored by the Fiji Arts Council.

Information for the Northern Craft Exhibition was disseminated to the Northern Women's Divisional Officers 2 months prior to the event which was also an opportunity for the exhibitors to be informed well in advance the standards of their participation in the Craft Competitions

Staging the FAC Competition in conjunction to the selections of the 80 Participants representing the Provinces of Cakaudrove, Bua and Macuata was a joint collaboration of Ministry and Women and Fiji Arts Council.

As highlighted by the Hon. Minister,

"The targeted number of participants has decreased compared to the past 3 years since the focus now is to select the best of the quality products produced by the women artisans as we want women to get attain the "Fijian Made" certification on their products and be able to export their products overseas. Of all exhibitors, 80 will be selected to participate at the National Women's Expo in Suva, based on their ability to meet market demands, and off course the quality of their products."

This was really challenge for the judges to select the best 80 practitioners out of the 145 exhibitors at the same time selecting those to be awarded prizes in the various craft categories as emphasized in the distributed information.

3.01 <u>CRITERIAS FOR THE SELECTIONS OF PRIZE AWARDEES SPONSORED BY FIJI ARTS</u> COUNCIL

The Judges based their assessments on the following criteria's in both the *Traditional and Contemporary Handicrafts;*

Quality of Craftsmanship: the standard of technical skill and attention to detail in the production of a product. Quality is assess based on the craft process but generally include:

Suitable and good quality raw materials

Proper processing of raw materials for attractiveness, longevity and durability

Attention to detail in the production process

Technical proficiency of the production skills

Strong construction and durability of the product, particularly in relations to the purpose of the product

The level of finishing of the product-finishing touches of the product is very important

Creativity: Creativity refers to the innovative use of one's own original designs, patterns, colours, etc. in any of the craft production processes. Creativity can include a product's design, shape, form, construction, colour, scale and proportions.

Crafts that are not mass produced.

All producers must make their own handicrafts, buying products from other source and selling or showcasing products in any competition is strictly prohibited.






