Report on the 1st & 2nd Jewellery Making Workshops

Introduction

The Jewellery Making Program (JMP) is facilitated by the Fiji Arts Council, funded by the New Zealand High Commission and has the support, involvement and the guidance of key stakeholders. The Tutu Training Center is a major stakeholder who has made valuable contributions towards the development of the program and extending its outreach. The outcomes of the program have so far exceeded all expectations and the Fiji Arts Council thanks those who have supported this initiative.

The entire program consists of a series of four workshops each spanning from 12 to 5 days conducted throughout 2013 at the Tutu Training Centre in Taveuni with travel expenses, accommodation and food provided. The workshop program consists of a series of jewellery making workshops and initiatives that aim to encourage and support entrepreneurial activity and assist craftspeople in producing a range of high quality, marketable handicrafts unique to Vanua Levu.

Description

The jewellery making program focuses on the development of:

- Jewllery making skills and techniques
- Knowledge of tools, materials and production methods
- Design, display and merchandising techniques and skills
- A business plan, entrepreneurial ability
- Life management skills

The Young Womens Jewellery Making Program

The Jewellery Making program is structured to multiplying capacity building by supporting and training those participating in the Jewelry Making Program to train others.

The Young Women's Jewellery Making Program (YWJMP), launched on March the 9th 2013, coordinated and facilitated through the Tutu Training Centre provides an example of how this will be achieved on the ground. Three handicraft trainers from the Tutu Centre participating in the JMP are receiving the practical assistance and support they need to conduct the Young Women's Jewellery Making Program throughout 2013. These workshops will be held in conjunction with the JMP and will follow the workshop model throughout the course of 2013. In this case the Young Women's Jewellery Making Program has extended its outreach to 38 young women from Macuata and Cakaudrove.




The 1st Workshop - Tutu Training Center 4th - 15th February 2013



Resources

Krishna Nair, a highly skilled and well regarded, jeweller from Suva conducted the training in the jewellery making activities outlined above. Krishna has comfortably maintained a lucrative handicraft enterprise specialising in a range of high quality coconut and mother of pearl jewellery for the past 40 years. At 70 years of age he possesses a wealth of experience and skills in jewelry making he wishes to pass onto others.

The 2nd Workshop - Tutu Training Center 23rd - 28th of April 2013

A Sevu Servu launched the 2nd jewellery making workshop at the Tutu Training Centre in Taveuni on the evening of the 22nd of April 2013.

Those participating in the Jewellery Making Program arrived at Tutu on the 22nd of April, keen to build on the skills they had gained in the first workshop and to try their hand at creating jewellery from mother of pearl shell. Since the first workshop most had continued to make jewellery using hand tools and by improvising using varnish to create a glossy finish as they didn't have access to sanding and polishing equipment. As a general rule jewellery that is varnished does not have the same professional finish as the jewellery that is polished on the machines, however, the work was none the less well crafted and stylish. Many have begun selling their jewellery to local and tourist markets; for example one participant has begun working with a dress maker to create fashion accessories which has been so far been quite profitable.

PRICING


All aspects of pricing were covered in the merchandising session conducted during the 2nd workshop. A simple method for pricing was introduced, the participants created a checklist and everyone was then given a book so that could document the pricing of each piece made during the remaining workshops.

EVALUATION

The human development session conducted by Serenia Madigibuli focused on the evaluation of the workshop program:

- How it met with the expectations of the participants
- The skills developed
- The practical assistance these skills have provided.
- Recommendations for future workshops

Each of the participants developed a series of short term practical goals that will assist in achieving greater aspirations in the future.



The focus for the first few days of the 2nd workshop was on the development of engraving and carving techniques. Great care was taken and all acquired the basic skills of engraving and carving










Top to Bottom: Sainimere and Roselea, Daya and Nita, Henry and Alpete developing skills in engraving and carving the coconut shell


Below: engraved coconut jewellery by Dimere, Henry.



The design activities encouraged the development of original ideas and exploring the formal principles of design. One of the activities included designing and creating a key ring for a resort in Vanua Levu. Another was creating a belt that is comfortable, durable, original in design, and appealing as a fashion accessory. Many of the belts created have yet to be assembled because the design relied upon the use of chain and other jewellery fixtures that needed to be ordered from Suva. 

The workshops taught professional methods in grinding, polishing and cutting the mother of pearl shell. The shell is donated by a local Taveuni /Savusavu pearl farm. The Quality of the shell provides a wide array of interesting tones, colours and features. The photographs below provide an illustration of the work produced during the 2nd workshop.

SUMMARY OF THE OUTCOMES

The workshops ran smoothly, any technical difficulties were quickly sorted amd virtually all was taken care of at Tutu. The level of skills that were developed during the workshops has been impressive so too has the level of commitment which has been high.

The first Young Women's Jewellery Making Workshop, which is run in conjunction with the Jewellry making Program, began on the 5th of March, ran for 5 weeks. The workshop was a great success- the young women thoroughly enjoyed the workshop and produced a very high standard of work. The trainers felt confident about facilitating the workshop and were very pleased with the outcomes and the level of dedication that the young women displayed. The second workshop in the program is currently underway – the young women will be learning how to engrave the coconut shell and how to cut polish and make jewellery from mother of pearl shell.

The Jewellery Making Program already shows enormous potential but it is a pilot program that requires more funding to reach its potential. Resources need to be invested in the program, thus the Fiji Arts Council has sought additional funding and worked to strengthen working relations between the organizations involved.

Future developments

The objectives of the workshop program are to build the capacity of the participants so that they are better equipped to sustain lucrative handicraft enterprises. It is advantageous for the participants to continue developing their skills outside of the formal workshop environment and to test the market potential in order to gain the most from the workshop program.

To assist in meeting these objectives the Fiji Arts Council applied for and received funding from the Department of National Heritage Culture and Arts to set up small 'Outreach Workshops'. The workshops will be comprised of three fully equipped workshop spaces established in Taveuni, Savusavu and Labasa; each fitted with buffing and sanding machines, bench space, and sandpaper with Jewellery fixtures and cutting blades sold from these workshops at cost price.

The rationale is to provide participants with access to sanding and polishing machines so they can complete their handicraft projects professionally and continue developing their skills independently- to maintain a continuum that enables the development of a wide range of skills within the time frame.

The grant covers the basic costs for tools and equipment while the workshop spaces will be provided by Tutu Training Center, the Caukendrove Provincial Council and Commissioner, Northern Division, Labasa. The equipment will be ordered from Australia during the next 2 weeks and it is envisaged that the workshops will be set up before mid June.

ADDITIONAL FUNDING

The New Zealand High commission HoMF grant has financed the major components of the workshop program to date. Travel expenses consume a high proportion of the budget, to accommodate for the overall cost of the program an application to assist with funding of travel and transport expenses for the program was submitted to PIPSO and approved on the 21st of April. This is a small grant but it will help with meeting costs.

- Conduct an additional workshop that focuses specifically on design, labeling, packaging and display
