



# KAUVULA / KAUDAMU YOUTH FELLOWSHIP MULTI-CRAFT SKILLS WORKSHOP

25<sup>th</sup> - 29<sup>th</sup> April, 2005.

#### 1.0 Introduction

The Fiji Arts Council under the auspices of the Department of Culture and Heritage recognizes that rural communities must not only be seen as partners in their own empowerment but must do so in practice. They must be strengthened to take leadership roles, encouraged self development, make decisions, take control, implement programs



and activities, especially youths to develop their values, attitudes, knowledge and skills and are accountable for their outcomes.

The Fiji Arts Council also recognizes that cultural industries have become the main platform for cultural expressions. Books, films, sounds, images and fashion, shapes the imagination of youth,

trace the source of their own values, principles and will and ultimately influence their behaviour and lifestyle in the years to come.

The response from the community awareness held in Kauvula / Kaudamu Methodist Church in Delainavesi, early 2005, acted as a catalyst in the community requesting for the need of the Fiji Arts Council to conduct community development workshop in the area to cater for the needs of the youths.

This workshop through the request of these youths around the Delainavesi Community consisting three Methodist Circuits, namely, Kauvula / Kaudamu, Kaleli, Korovou and Tamavua I Wai.


#### 2.0 Aims and Objectives

The aim and objectives of such workshops are to assist participants in the following:

- Creating enabling environment that increase learning and employment opportunities for rural and disadvantage communities, especially the youths to develop the values, attitudes, the knowledge and skills aware of their cultural heritage.
- To prepare them to be responsible and productive citizens in their communities and society.
- Encouraging self development to improve their ways and means of living.
- Learn to appreciate and utilize local resources such as sea shells, seeds, vau strings coconut shells and coconut fibre as means of great potentials and lucrative talent, considering the fact that the raw materials are in great abundance.
- Learn subsidiary skills that would supplement existing traditional practises, on the verge of disappearance, in terms of economic survival, in the long term. For instance, screen printing, jewellery making and basket weaving.
- Enhance the transmission of traditional and contemporary knowledge to the younger generation. This will be the opportunity for the participants to be recognized for outstanding achievements in a rage of practices relating to art and craft making.


#### 3.0 Official Opening:

The youths invited Reverend Nemani Kunatuba, *Talatala – Tabacakacaka o Suva* to officiate and blessed the opening of the one week workshop which began on the 25<sup>th</sup> April, 2005. The youths were blessed by his presence since he had encouraged them to work together towards the betterment of their communities. He encouraged the youths to take heed of the importance of learning the skills from the resource people as an opportunity in engaging the leisure time in daily useful activities.

There were thirty seven (37) participants attend the workshop, out of the 37 participants four (4) were grown up adults with the age group from 54 – 64yrs of age. List of participants has attached to this report.

Finau Mara – a basket weaver






Marica Lomasalato - Screen Printer.


#### 6.0 Materials Used:


In Screen Printing they used materials (Mal material- for tie and dye, Cotton material- for Screen Printing), paints, green film, squeegee, handsaw, hammer, ply-board, and nails. On the first day of the workshop, the participants learned how to create different designs. Jewellery making — Sea shells, beads, wavau, and magimagi was used by Samuela to teach them.

Basket weaver - she used voivoi (somo, paogo, vulavula).










In one of her speech, she highlighted the importance of education. She said education is not end in school but continue till the end of life. She was accompanied by the Director of the Institute Misiwaini Language and Culture. Ro of Fijian Qeregeretabua. After the closing ceremony, participants performed a Meke, called Vakamalolo (whereby they sit and perform), to farewell the Assistant Minister and the Invited Guests. The workshop was blessed with the presence of the Talatala - Tabacakacaka ko Suva, Rev. Nemani

Kunatuba whereby he shares a Good News to the participants. The Fiji Film and TV Unit, Photography section, Ministry of Information, Media personals whose presence at the workshop was beneficial as they were able to take coverage of the workshop.


#### 8.0 Budget



#### 9.0 Recommendation

The Workshop was fruitful as the following constructive comments and suggestions were made by participants, observers and the Department of Culture and Heritage.

- Facilitation of an additional Workshop to enhance Basket Weaving and Jewellery Making Skills in the areas concerned.
- Upgrade and develop art and craft skills.
- Diversify source of incoming generating projects in the Kauvula/ Kaudamu Youths since a market for their products is already in place. Other areas of art and crafts could include Meke performances, masi making, flower arrangements, Bamboo making e.t.c can be taught in the area to improve their source of living.
- Evaluation program to be facilitated after the Workshop to gauge the extent of workshop.
   Have the participants learnt a great deal from the latter? Or is it just for participation sakes?






