## SAWAKASA WOMEN 'S GROUP CRAFT DEVELOPMENT WORKSHOP-SAWAKASA 1 VILLAGE – 21<sup>ST</sup> - 25<sup>th</sup> September, 2015

#### 1.0 Introduction

**2.0** The Fiji Arts Council in partnership with the Department of Heritage and Arts, had conducted a workshop for the women of the Tikina Sawakasa in the Province of Tailevu.

The Tikina Sawakasa Women's Group comprises of six villages (Sawakasa (ii), Sawakasa (i), Dakuinuku, Lodoni, Wainivilimi, and Waito)

The initiative for the craft development was agreed in their Talanoa session that was held at Sawakasa No 1 on Thursday August at 2:30pm. The participants were taught 3 different skills, Basket weaving, Tye & Dye and Jewelry making.


#### 2.0 Aims and Objectives

The women of Sawakasa had expressed their interest with the views to eliminate buying of non —Fijian made handicrafts imported into the country. An alternative to this, the support and encouragement for the women to make use of abundantly local resources such as sea shells, local seeds, local strings and other local materials that are readily available at surroundings to upgrade craft skills to a better standard that will becoming source of income to their families. An opportunity of gaining new skills in handicraft development that will generate economic returns through selling their own homemade.



New Skills of Jewelry Making - earrings from local pearl shells, belts from icibi seeds and bracelets from coconut shells

A means of empowering women to remind themselves of their traditions and create opportunities to generate additional income in promoting their own natural resources within their communities to sell authentic products.

In gaining the new skills and knowledge, the Women of Tikina Sawakasa will assist their families in meeting their social obligations, educational needs and contribute enormously in their everyday living.

#### 3.0 Funding

The Fiji Arts Council had requested \$7,958.00 through the Cultural Grant Scheme as administered by the Department of Heritage Arts as contribution of the Sawakasa Women's Group towards the expenses of resource materials for Tie & Dye, Jewelry, and basket weaving, accommodation and meals for resource persons and workshop organizers.

#### 4.0 Logistics:

#### 4.1 Pre- Preparation of the Workshop

The main role of the Fiji Craft Society was to identify resource persons to impart the different skills required by the Women of Tikina Sawakasa in the one week's training. A few consultations took place with their village representative in the office, indicating specific tasks and activities to be put in place before we visit the village and finally discuss with women's group and confirm on the workshop dates and the number of participants.

A meeting was then convened with the Women representatives of the 6 villages (Sawakasa One/Two, Waito, Wainivilimi, Dakuinuku, and Lodoni and representatives of FAC, whereby they had confirmed and recommended 21<sup>st</sup> -25<sup>th</sup> September, 2015 was a convenient time to hold the training. It was also agreed that the skills of jewelry making, basket weaving, screen printing and tie & dye skills were most significant for the women to learn, as this will contribute a great deal to the development in their already possess talents.

The participants were requested to prepare themselves with the various local materials such as local shells, seeds, vau strings, coconut shells, x-ray films and their own created designs before the workshop. These materials were to substitute other materials and equipment provided for by the Fiji Arts Council.

#### 4.2 Official Opening



District Officer Tailevu Mr Iakobo Waqanidrola officiated the opening of the workshop

The first day program began with a registration program of (49) Forty-nine participants before the official opening by The District Officer, lakobo Waqanidrola was invited to grace the opening of the one week's workshop on Monday 21<sup>st</sup> September in the presence of the Rev. Etuate Lasaro of Sawakasa Methodist Church who blessed the juncture.

The District Officer, Mr lakobo Waqanidrola had highlighted the importance of such training. It was an opportunity that required their time and commitment in gaining new knowledge and skills for the betterment of their everyday living. He thanked the Fiji Arts Council in assisting them to make the workshop possible and the three resource persons in sharing the God gifted talents that they have.


Also advise the participants to continue with the skills that they will be learning from the one week training and preserve the knowledge that will be passing down to them from the resource person.


Try and grasp all what you are going to be taught in this workshop. You have to show the determination and commitment to learn these skills because it will surely pay you a higher prize in the near future.


The participants were separated into three groups led by the three Trainers. One group to learn Jewelry making and the other to learn Basket weaving, Screen printing and Tie & Dye.




The **Jewelry making** program provided an opportunity for the participants to build their skills, explore materials and become familiar with a wide range of jewelry techniques

- . Participants were also taught on the basic knowledge in using of tools and equipment -
  - such as hand drills, coping saws and hacksaw
  - drilling of shells, coconut shells, seeds
  - to cut and shape earrings and necklaces from whole husked matured and young coconut

- sandpapering sea shells and coconut shells
- cleaning of shells, using of wood glue,
- using crepe papers for coloring vau strings
- using jewelry fittings for jewelry pieces
- making icibi belts (local seeds) woven with vau strings

In **Screen Printing,** the participants were required to draw their own designs on paper and then transferred their art work into x-ray films





- using cutters to shape their own designs
- learning the printing techniques
- mixing of fabric paint




#### 4.4 Official Closing




He also emphasized on the importance of using locally sourced materials which are readily available and in abundance in Sawakasa.




#### **Resource People:**

This workshop was conducted by Samuela Cabe who is an expert in traditional and contemporary jeweler and a well-known designer of art in Fiji and Laisani Mara who is a Master Basket Weaver and Marica Lomasalato expert in Screen printing and Tie & Dye.

These Resource persons are recipients for the Fijian Crafted License. Fijian Crafted Licenses certifies them as legitimate makers and sellers of Fijian Crafted products and have now been recognized by Government for their initiatives in teaching their God gifted skills in village communities, National and International levels.

Also Recipients as live members for the Fiji Craft Society have also represented Fiji in Regional events such as the Pacific Festival and Melanesian Festivals. They have also been instrumental in various community handicrafts skills development workshop organized by the Fiji Arts Council and have also been awarded with numerous awards by the Fiji Arts Council towards their outstanding achievements in yearly craft competitions at both the traditional and contemporary category.






Samuela Cabe – Contemporary Jewelry Maker

#### **Workshop Participants:**

The 49 women from the Tikina Sawakasa Women's Group in the village of Lodoni, Dakuinuku, Wainivilimi, Waito, Sawakasa I & II received their certificates after training in jewelry making, screen printing and Tie & dye and Basket Weaving during the one weeks' workshop. The participant's age group ranged from mid – seventies to twenties and oldest participants is 84yrs old. This workshop involved youths group in the village.
